My Grandfather, Joe Kasmer, immigrated from Poland to Detroit in 1909, where my mother, Fannie "Faye" Kasmer Bruner was born in 1917. She married my father, Mason E. Bruner, in Ypsilanti, and they raised my brother and I in Dearborn where we moved in 1952. I was born in Detroit in 1946 at Woman's Hospital, and my brother, Josef Bruner, born there in 1947. I graduated from Edsel Ford High School in 1964. I attended Henry Ford Community College and obtained a degree in fine arts. I married Ronald J. Markowicz, who graduated from Lowrey High School, in Dearborn Heights. We and raised four children in Troy, Michigan. Ron retired from Ford Motor Company Research and Development Center and we now live in a small New England town in the Allegheny Mountains of South Central Pennsylvania. We still remember our Detroit upbringing, fun times at Edgewater Park, Boblo Island, in the summer, long drives on Hines Park Drive, picnics at Belle Isle, seeing Chuck Berry at the Walled Lake Casino in 1965, CKLW, WXYC, WKNR, and all the great times we had being raised in Metro Detroit in the 1950s and 1960s. I saw Dion Warwick perform for the first time publicly at CKLW studio in Dearborn, when she was but 16 years old, singing "Walk On By." And what about our own Detroit children's shows and celebrities including Milky the Clown and his magic words, "Twin Pines," Miss Artice Keneely's Romper Room for children, Shock Theater and Sir Graves Ghastly, Johnny Ginger and the old Three Stooges movies, Soupy Sales for lunch with White Fang and Black Tooth, and Popeye cartoons with Captain Toby? As teens we followed the Beatles from Metro Airport to the old Windemere Hotel on Jefferson in 1964 where they waved from their high rise suite to the crowd below. Remember when the Rotunda burned down? We watched that tragic event from our high school windows which was located on Rotunda Drive. Remember Bill Kennedy Showtime, Jack LaGoff and the news, and of course the unequalled Detroit Icon, Sonny Elliot? I remember Sonny doing the weather on tv when I was a small child back in the 1950s. There was Van Patrick and Ray Lane, doing the sports, and of course Diana Lewis, still going strong. There is so much to remember, dinner at Topinka's Country Road House on Telegraph and Seven Mile. They served the best turtle soup in the country. And Trader Vic's, and the Playboy Club on Jefferson. Remember Plum Street hippie heaven in the 1970s? Lots of incense and flower children handing out in little stores and houses. What about the giant stove at the entrance of Belle Isle. And, of course, there was the controversial Mayor Orville Hubbard of Dearborn, and the colorful Detroit Mayor Jerry Cavanaugh, and the never to be forgotten Mayor. We saw Fidler on the Roof, starring Zero Mostel, performed at the Fisher Theater before it went to Broadway in 1965. Too many memories, too little time. Thanks for this great site.

Just received news of your website... and a GREAT ONE it is! Thanks for all your effort in putting it together. Maybe we will meet at the Arizona- Detroiters Dinner in April. Looking forward to it. I was born at Holy Cross Hospital in 1952, grew up around 6 Mile Rd. & Van Dyke while attending Holy Name Elementary School until 1966, and I graduated from St. Anthony H.S. in 1970 near Gratiot and E. Grand Blvd (renamed East Catholic H.S.) We spent lots of time at Belle Isle. And like my dad, Gus Pehur, SR., who retired from the National Bank of Detroit, I too worked downtown at Handleman Company (now in Troy) and I just loved being in the city. In reading many of the contributions, it dawned on me that we, who grew up in and around the Detroit area, put on a lot of miles using the Public Transportation Systems. Before learning to drive, I road the buses everywhere... school, work, shopping... not like these days where I believe many have never even been on a bus. I do remember the street cars but I was far too little to remember much about them. I also rode the train north to Birmingham. And now there is the "people mover" monorail system... haven't seen it since I haven't been back in years, but I still promote Detroit as the great city I grew up in... and people still cringe at the thought when they hear me talk about those days. Detroit still seems to scare people. It shouldn't. "Don't knock it 'til you try it." It really is a great place and I do believe there is hope for its continued renewal ... I think that things are coming along much better than the city gets credit for. I still subscribe to HOUR Magazine and when it arrives, the first thing I go to is the last page... to see some of "OLD" Detroit. I have several pictures in our family albums of the area on Elgin St. where we were only three houses from the fence of Detroit City Airport which allowed us to watch the planes come and go, even before the Tech School was built near McNichols. I could walk or ride my bike right up to the huge old tank that used to be on the curve of French Rd. I took music lessons on Van Dyke just past Burroughs School. My dad used to sell tickets part time at the roller rink on 9 Mile & Van Dyke... I got to skate for free. My cousins used to race soap box cars down Derby Hill. I have many, many relatives resting at Mt. Olive Cemetery. We spent many summer days at the Lipke Pool just north of 7 Mile Rd. & Van Dyke. Some days, we could actually hear the boats from the River. I know, I know, it's not the best part of Detroit anymore... but my own personal memories of the good old days are wonderful and they will never change.

On a related topic: I often worked on George's TV travel program as a freelance announcer doing commercials for a variety of sponsors in the 1950's. He was the most relaxed performer in the world! When the travelogue he was showing had its own sound track he would often fall asleep to be awakened by the Stage Manager moments before the commercial break. Your grandfather was a wonderful man. He was admired by all who knew him.
